


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NEW LEARNING FORMAT

At the start of the year 2020, a major change happened to education. Even though our education system improved and adapted over the years, nothing has ever made such a significant impact as the COVID-19 pandemic. The start of the academic year at many schools was postponed for two months to limit the virus's spread. Moreover, with this epidemic, teachers could not teach the classes the traditional way anymore.



AT SCHOOL

Each school has different methods to handle this situation. Our school started the academic year with staggered learning schedules to allow social distancing in class. Learning was a combination of inperson learning for 3 days per week, and online check-ins and learning for 2 other days. Schoolwide, we adopted the flipped classroom model to value students' time at school. From our personal experience, online learning has both pros and cons. There are many benefits to it for high school students because it lets them focus and prepare for university applications. However, online learning isn't as effective as traditional offline learning.

In traditional offline learning, we can ask a question right away, but online learning limits the interaction between teachers and students. It is the most inconvenient for kindergarten and primary school students. For this age group, the learning atmosphere has an enormous impact on their learning effectiveness.



No one expects this unfortunate situation to happen, but it is irrevocable, so we have to find alternatives for the traditional classroom. For now, this method is a well-organized solution for Satit Kaset IP. Since the future is unpredictable, we need to be prepared for any possible situation.



I was honored to catch up with one of Satit Kaset's fascinating alumni, Lilly Lee. Considering the field of science is still male-dominated, it was a pleasure to interview a woman driven to achieve her science goals and in an unorthodox manner. She's been very busy since graduating from Mahidol University, now working hard with her research about neuroscience in Germany.

Q: Can you tell me a little about yourself please?

A: In terms of education, I graduated with two BSc (Bachelor of Science) in Biomedical science. Worked for a few years. Then, came to Germany for Msc (Master of Science) in Neuroscience. Went back to Thailand to do research at VISTEC. Then back here again in Germany for my PhD.

Q: Where do you see yourself in 5 years?

A: I'm pretty sure that the answer will change every year. If you asked me 5 years ago, I would say working in some kind of clinic. Hopefully, I can finish my PhD in 3 years and do some research. But the average time to finish the PhD in my field is 4-5 years.

Q: What guidance would you give high school students who are struggling to choose what to study in university?

A: People's thoughts change all the time. It's normal to try something first, and if it's not working for you, just go with your gut and try something else. Opportunities are everywhere. You just have to look for them.

Q: Do you have any advice for students going through high school?

A: I suppose you should enjoy it more. East/SE Asian countries emphasize education for kids. I don't think it's bad. However, it's also important to let the students explore more about themselves, like extracurricular activities and clubs. I heard that now there are many competitions that KUSIP sends its students to. That is great! There weren't many in my years. I did enter a science competition hosted by NECTEC, but that's it. Heard a few years ago that Aj. Sim wanted to form a debate team. Actually, I pitched this idea in 2012! I was in Mahidol's debate team and hosted many competitions nation and international wide. I want my school to compete since we have lots of awesome students.





Q: Finally, do you have advice for seniors preparing for college?


A: I think for the IP12 students, it's the last year of school but it's not for learning. It's perfectly normal to get stressed. But they will also have to learn that getting into university is just the start of one chapter. Q: What guidance would you give high school students who are struggling to choose what to study in university?

A: A theoretical advice is to try out a lot of things. You might like doing things you never thought you would like and vice versa but as a student, your opportunities for work experience may be limited. A practical advice is not to worry about it too much, and do what you can. You will know what university, faculty to choose when it's time because you will not be making your choice in a vacuum. You will have a number of university offers. When it's the time to make your choice, YOU will make the best choice for your future. The best thing you can do is to keep your options open. Study hard, and apply to areas that suit your interests.



Q: Any advice to high school students and seniors preparing for college?

A: My advice to high school students including seniors are: advanced preparation, activities, and enjoy school.

- 1. Be prepared in advance. Start taking those IELTS, TOEFL, SAT, CU, TU tests when you are in Semester 2 of Grade 10. These results will be valid by the time of your university applications. The results will tell you what subjects you need to work on. You will also have time to retake those again. Also, start jotting down the university application dates and prepare the documents you need. Have all documents ready when application periods open.
- 2. Aside from your academic achievements, your portfolios: activities or leadership roles that you do will make you an outstanding candidate amongst other applicants. Therefore, participate in those extracurricular activities such as learn an additional language, sports, Junior Achievement Competitions, drawings, designs, inventions, music compositions or be a Yearbook staff. Arrange and date those activities in a Resume, or a portfolio. It will come in handy in further education and job applications. Still, enjoy High School. It was one of my most memorable times at KUSIP. Enjoy those school plays, take photos, spend time with your friends and teachers, play sports. Believe me, when you look back, you will miss it.

Q: What's your opinion on student protests?

MOVIE REVIEW MULAN

Disney's newest live-action remake of the animated classic, "Mulan," was the first to come out after quarantine and has surpassed many expectations. With a production budget of \$200 million, it is the most expensive film ever made by a female director. The film develops a balanced mix between Chinese culture and a Hollywood-style plot. The visual effects are stunning. Also, the scenes of the movie are absolutely fascinating, especially the action scenes which made the Chinese army and the war look magnificent. The new film still keeps the original story's cultural morales: loyalty, bravery, truth, and devotion to family.

In contrast to the 1998 animated original, which had a bright tone and comedic action scenes, this new film had a more somber tone and is more action-packed. They also decided to remove talking animals and don't feature nearly as many songs even though it's one of the things that truly define a Disney movie and has been there since their film debut. Changes were made to the main character, Mulan, making her more independent and, therefore strong.

These changes to the characters had a negative effect on the movie because it makes us less connected to Mulan, who no longer has to struggle as much on gaining the strength she needs compared to the original version. In addition, how the story developed before reaching its climax and conclusion is still somewhat lacking in detail. Ultimately, movie's changes resulted in a straight-faced affair and delivered a big spectacle, but lacked the poetry of its own.

TRAVEL GUIDE APARTHEID MUSEUM

"No one is born hating another person because of the color of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, and if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite." Nelson Mandela

Last December, my family and I (Wisumitra) visited South Africa. As I walked through the segregated gateway of the Apartheid Museum into the darkest era of South Africa, chilling metal corridors leading into the museum gave me a glimpse of what life was like under apartheid. The exhibitions displayed the start of the brutal time period, the injustice, and served as a reminder for newer generations to not be ignorant of this horrific event. Exhibitions in honor of Nelson Mandela's legacy left a huge impact on all of the visitors, including myself. Photographs of violence and political uproars reflected how people fought for equality for 48 years.

HISTORY OF APARTHEID IN SOUTH

Apartheid originated after the National Party, an all-white government, gained power in South Africa in 1948. Their purpose was to make the minority white South Africans superior to the majority races. The laws were to ensure the minority whites would not be overshadowed in society, while the majority of the population were barely able to sustain their basic needs. Although the system may have been alleviated by the leadership of Nelson Mandela, this issue of significant inequality is still present to this day, not just in South Africa but worldwide.

TRAVEL GUIDE PAINTBAR

Paintbar is not an art school, but it is both a cafe and bar in Bangkok, combining art and nightlife with the concept, "Paint, Sip, Repeat". No art background is needed because the instructors will guide you through the process. In order to go there, you need to make a reservation through the Line ID @paintbarbangkok.

There are 5 sessions which are 10:00-12:00, 12:30-14:20, 15:00-17:00, 17:30-19:30, and 20:00-22:00. Each session costs 799 Baht per person. However, if you do not want to paint the daily picture that they provide, you will have to pay an additional 300 baht.

The maximum number of people attending each session is 12. There is no age limit, but we suggest that children under the age of 7 should have a guardian with them. For the daily picture session, there will be an instructor guiding you through each step in front of the room, and others would walk around to help each person who struggles with painting. You can also order food and drinks. They provide you with canvases, acrylic paint, aprons, and paintbrushes with different sizes. Your painting will be placed in a plastic bag and you will have time to take some pictures of your masterpiece.

FOOD REVIEW TACO BELL



Taco Bell is an American fast food restaurant based out of Irvine, California, founded in 1962 by Glen Bell. It is a subsidiary of Yum! Brands, Inc. The restaurants serve a variety of Mexicaninspired foods, such as tacos, burritos, quesadillas, nachos, etc.

Taco Bell officially opened at a Thai outlet, Mercury Ville, Chidlom, Bangkok. We went to the Siam Paragon branch, and here are some thoughts on the dishes. We ordered some of the most famous dishes, which are Supreme Crunch Wrap, "Grilled Stuff" burrito, chicken tacos, and Mexican fries. These dishes are rich in chicken, beef, and vegetables like lettuce and tomato. The extra nacho cheese dip also adds a lot to the Mexican fries. The ingredients are proportioned pretty evenly. There is enough of everything that it is identifiable, and yet nothing is overpowering. Best of all, there isn't too much sour cream.
